

NEWCASTLE BEACH PARK

BELLEVUE, WASHINGTON

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This popular beach park was created on one of the last undeveloped stretches of Bellevue's Lake Washington shoreline. An elegant and rhythmic design blends public recreation areas within preserved and restored natural shoreline and uplands.

Years of community opposition had prevented earlier attempts to develop this park.

Jones & Jones addressed the concerns of the park's neighbors and critics in workshops, and gained their ownership of the project. The park includes picnic facilities, a swimming beach, nature trails, and a restored salmon-bearing stream.

The caretaker's cottage, lifeguard station, and other park structures—award-winning designs—are sited with respect for the land and the lake. In form, materials, and climatic

response, they are related to the historic structures built in the Puget Sound area by early European settlers, fishermen, and coal miners.
