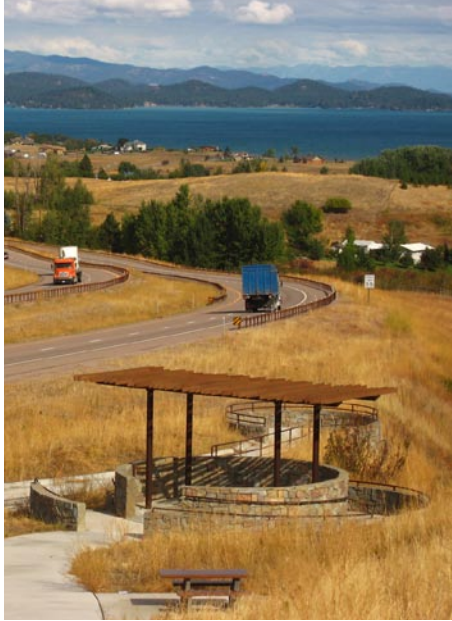




U.S. HIGHWAY 93 THROUGH THE FLATHEAD INDIAN RESERVATION

U.S. Highway 93 traverses the Flathead Indian Reservation for fifty-five miles along the base of the Mission Mountains in western Montana on its way to Glacier National Park.

The corridor is home to grizzly bears, elk, deer, painted turtles and a number of fish and birds. It is also the homeland of the Bitterroot Salish, Lower Pend Oreille and Kootenai Tribes.

With Jones & Jones as design consultants, this famous highway was reconstructed as a respectful “visitor” to the land, the people and the wildlife. The project demonstrates ways the land can shape the road by:

- protecting and restoring sensitive natural and cultural resources
- respecting the way of life in the rural towns along this historic route; and
- giving travelers a deeper understanding of this scenic cultural landscape in the Northern Rockies.

With forty wildlife underpasses and overpasses, this road reconstruction has significantly increased the number of wildlife crossings on U.S. roads.
